Advice For Parents:

Planning Ahead: Timeline for a Successful Senior Year

Fall: Plan Wisely for Application Season

- Track Deadlines for application submissions
- If required for admission or scholarship applications, request recommendations from teachers, employers, and/or guidance counselors, and begin writing rough drafts of essays
- o Attend college fairs and schedule college visits
- o Meet with your counselor to stay on track of admission requirements
- o Complete applications and let the Guidance office know where you are applying so transcripts can be sent
- Register for the ACT/SAT if necessary
- o Start working on scholarship searches and applications
- o Stay on track with your grades and extracurricular activities

Winter: Finalize Admission and Scholarship Applications

- Keep track of deadlines (cannot stress this enough !!)
- o Complete all applications
- Continue with scholarship search
- Complete FAFSA online to determine financial aid eligibility. (Have your parents gather their IRS tax returns they will be needed on the FAFSA)
- o Stay on track with your grades and extracurricular activities

Spring: "The Home Stretch"

- Follow up on your college applications
- o Watch mail and e-mail for college decisions
- o Review colleges acceptances and compare financial aid offers
- Make your final college decision (May 1 is the last to day to notify many schools of your intent to attend)
- Prepare for End of the Year exams
- Graduate Strong!

Xenia High School College Application Procedure:

College application deadlines are early!! College applications should be submitted by October 31, 2022. We encourage you to get busy filling out applications to the college(s) or the university (ies) of your choice! In addition to your application, colleges and universities will need a copy of our high school transcript. The transcript should be sent after you have applied to the college or university.

Most college applications should be completed online. Some select schools accept the common app application. Miami University, University of Cincinnati and Ohio State University are only using the common app application. It is available online at <u>www.commonapp.org</u>.

Once you have submitted your application, please follow the steps listed below to ensure all of the correct paperwork is submitted in order to complete your college application:

Step 1: Complete your college application online

Step 2: Request that a copy of your transcript be sent to the colleges you are applying to.

Step 3: You must fill out and sign the transcript request form in order for us to mail an official transcript. Your counselor will complete and mail all materials to your school.

Step 4: Your counselor will complete and mail all materials to your school.

Step 5: If your application requires a teacher recommendation, please contact the teacher first and ask him/her if they would be willing to write you a letter of recommendation and give them plenty of time to write it. It is appropriate to provide the teacher a stamped, addressed envelope to mail the letter of recommendation.

Step 6: Please make sure to notify your counselor of all college acceptances and scholarships you receive. Bring these letters to the Guidance Office and a copy will be made for our files. College acceptances will be printed in the February Senior Newsletter.

Life After High School:

It may not seem like it, but your senior year is going to go by very quickly! We hope that you have been able to come up with a plan for "Life after high school". Many of you are planning on going to college in the fall of 2023. Some of you plan to finish school and join the workforce after graduation, and a few will be going to the military to serve our country after graduation.

Here are some things to consider as you decide on what you want to do after graduation:

HOW DO I CHOOSE A COLLEGE? There are hundreds of colleges and universities throughout the United States. Narrowing your choices down to one can be difficult. If you are trying to select a college or university, following are some factors you will want to consider:

SIZE: Enrollments can vary from 100 to over 50,000. What size would be best for you?

TYPE: Is the college co-educational or for only males or females? Is it primarily a liberal arts college or is it a specialized school? Is it state supported or is it a private/religious affiliated school?

LOCATION: Does it have a country or city atmosphere? Is it one to which you could commute or would you have to live on campus? How far is it from home?

STANDING: Is it fully accredited? What type of faculty does it have? What is the ratio of faculty to students? Does it offer the program you want?

EXTRA-CURRICULAR: Does it have the activities in which you are interested?

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS: Are they comparable to your past achievements?

COST AND AID: What is the cost of the college versus the amount of aid or work opportunities they typically provide? How much financial help will be available from your family? (Note: Some out-of-state schools are less expensive than in-state schools.) DO NOT RELY ON THE STICKER PRICE!

TRANSFER OF CREDITS: Many students plan to attend a 2-year school with the idea of transferring to a 4-year school. Be sure to check to see if courses will apply to your intended degree. The site www.transferology.com will allow students to compare courses for three schools at a time.

WHAT TO CONSIDER WHEN DECIDING ON A JOB OR CAREER:

YOUR INTERESTS: Do you enjoy helping people, working with your hands, working with information and numbers, creating, designing, being outdoors? Identify your possibilities. One of the most important factors in career satisfaction is liking what you do.

SALARY: What salary can you expect to make in your chosen field? After two or three years of experience? After ten years? Talk with employers; get realistic estimates on what the return on your investment will be.

ADVANCEMENT: Is your career open-ended? Where will it lead you? Will it offer the opportunity to eventually start your own business if that is your goal? Are there more trained people than there are jobs in your career? Choose a career with a good future, and make sure you won't become obsolete in a few years.

JOB MOBILITY: Where are the jobs in your career specialty? Are they available in your area, or would you be required to relocate or travel? For example, commercial drivers usually have to relocate. Computer programmers often work in large or medium-sized cities. Medical workers are usually found everywhere.

WORKING CONDITIONS: Find out what your working conditions will be. Don't be unpleasantly surprised on the job. Before you make up your mind about a career, get all the facts.

EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS: Nearly every good job today requires specialized training beyond high school. Find out what kind of training is required for your career.

SKILLS: Employers can teach skills specific to a job. They are looking for people with the following abilities:

- 1. Good written and verbal communication skills
- 2. Dependability able to complete a task without supervision
- 3. Attendance will show up on time every day

MILITARY CAREERS

Local military recruiters will be contacting you to see if you are interested in joining the military after graduation. If you can schedule a time to meet with them after school, it will be greatly appreciated. Should you need to see them during the school day, the following procedure must be followed:

- 1. A parent note is required, if you are under 18 years of age, giving permission to see the recruiter.
- 2. Visits may occur only during study hall or lunch

Paying For College

For most seniors planning on attending college, the admission process is finished. The next big step is to apply for financial aid. In order to be considered for financial aid, students and parents must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA is the federal form that the U.S. Department of Education uses to determine how much federal student aid you qualify for. The FAFSA must be completed online at www.fafsa.gov.

Steps for Applying for Federal Aid		
Step 1	Collect documents needed to complete the FAFSA

Step 2	Complete the FAFSA between Oct. 1 and June 30 (The sooner you complete the FAFSA, the sooner	
	you will be notified of your financial aid package!)	
Step 3	Federal Student Aid will send you a Student Aid Report (SAR). This is a summary of the information from your	
	FAFSA. The SAR will contain your Expected Family Contribution (EFC)	
	and this is the number colleges use to determine your federal student aid eligibility.	
Step 4	You will receive award letters from each college that received your FAFSA information. The award letters will tell	
	you how much financial aid the college is able to offer you. Financial aid awards are usually a combination of	
	grants, Scholarships, loans and/or work-study.



Which parent(s) do I include on my FAFSA form?

 Are your parents are married to each other? If yes, include both, parent's information on the FAFSA.

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- Do your parents live together? If yes, report information for both parents on the FAFSA even if they were never married, are separated, or are divorced.
- For divorced parents, the FAFSA parent is the one the student lived with more during the past 12 months.
 If residence was split 50/50, the parent who provided more financial
- If residence was split 50/50, the parent who provided more financial support during the past 12 months is the FAFSA parent.
- If that parent is now remarried, step-parent income information is required. (As of the date the FAFSA is completed).

- If none of the above apply you might have a special circumstance.
- Your parent does not have to claim on taxes.



PROVIDE YOUR FINANCIAL Information

Students and parents may be eligible to use the IRS Data Retrieval Tool (IRS DRT). This tool allows you to securely transfer original IRS tax return information to the FAFSA without having to manually enter in the required IRS tax return information. This tool is quicker and recommended if it's available.



SIGN AND SUBMIT YOUR FAFSA FORM

If you are a dependent student, your parent will need to sign the form as well before submitting.

SIGN AND SUBMIT TIPS:

Make sure you and your parent do not mix up FSA IDs.

Sign the FAFSA form with an FSA ID because it is the fastest way to get your FAFSA form processed.
